Elijah Cummings

October 17, 2019

Known for being a fighter for rights in his hometown. Baltimore, he also became famous for his involvement in the impeachment investigation of President Trump.

Elected to Congress in 1996, Cummings was the Democratic representative from Maryland's 7th Congressional District in the U.S. House. Cummings made history when he became the first African American in the state to be named Speaker Pro Tempore during his 14 terms in the Maryland House of Delegates.

We remember Elijah Cummings for being the Chair of the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform, and a member of the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

John Lewis

July 17, 2020

An American statesman and civil rights leader, John Lewis is known for fighting for the rights of people. Dr. Martin Luther King's life inspired Lewis to join the struggle for civil rights.

Elected to Congress in 1986, Lewis was the Democratic representative from Georgia's 5th District in the House of Representatives. Prior to that, Lewis ran for office for the Atlanta City Council in 1981 and won.

Lewis has several accomplishments under his belt, including healthcare reform, measures to fight poverty, improvements in education, and overseeing multiple renewals of the Voting Rights Act.

We remember John Lewis for leading a sit-in with 40 House Democrats and forcing Congress to address gun violence by taking definitive legislative action.

Ruth Bader Ginsburg

September 18, 2020

An Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, Ruth Bader Ginsburg was a champion of equality under the law. Ginsburg was nominated by former President Bill Clinton in 1993 and served on the Supreme Court until her death.

Prior to Ginsburg's role as Associate Justice, she was appointed by former President Jimmy Carter as Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit in 1980

We remember Ruth Bader Ginsburg for her contributions to gender equality and civil rights winning her the Thurgood Marshall Award from the American Bar Association.



PFDW Helps Our Candidates

We have 80 women running for office in PA this year. Because 2020 is so significant, the PAC Committee voted to make an exception to our usual policy so we could donate to every one of their campaigns. We had a number of reasons we hope you will agree with.

First, we are celebrating our milestones. This year is the 100th anniversary of our right to vote. If we win the presidential election, we will finally have a woman Vice President in Kamala Harris. And not least, we wish to memorialize the passing of the Notorious RBG, outstanding Justice and cultural rock star.

Second, we are mindful of self-defense. Not only do we need to do all we can to help our seven women running for Congress and our statewide candidate, we also need to take back the State Legislature to stop many destructive moves underway there.

Nominations for grants came from clubs around the state. Their candidates got the maximum amount of money available for their offices. Normally we don't consider legislative candidates who aren't nominated by clubs, but this year's exception was to give lesser amounts to those candidates. We are encouraging them to found new clubs in their areas. We all know one thing is true: no woman candidate can succeed without strong women volunteers.

The PAC Committee reached out to Congressional and statewide candidates. Next year, the Committee will take the lead with statewide judicial candidates while clubs handle their local races.

Our 80 candidates represent an increase from the 65 in 2018, which was a vast improvement over previous years. In 2015, PA got a D- for women's participate in politics, ranking 45th among states. We now have 26.9% of PA's statewide and federal offices. That number is, obviously, awful, but it's double where we were in 2006. The Federation can play a vital role in bringing up these percentages, and with them, creating a fairer and wiser world.

The York County of Federation Women (YCFDW) started the year off participating with the York Women's March on January 20, 2020. Approximately 150 people marched the streets of Downtown York to Continental Square, the heart of the city, to hear incredible speakers and mingle with like-minded people.

In February we met for the first time inperson for 2020 and had a packed house! More than 80 people attended to hear Auditor General Eugene DePasquale, candidate for the Democratic nomination for Senate seat PA-10, speak. We were excited to have our local ABC affiliate cover the meeting.

At this meeting, we also rolled out our Virtual Tea Party fundraiser. To honor the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment, we created a tea party bag with a teacup and saucer, tea, a copy of the 19th Amendment, a

pen, and a copy of the book *Roses and Radicals* by Susan Zimet. Almost 50 tea bags were sold! The money raised through this fundraiser went to our PAC fund for our candidates.

Unfortunately, as many clubs, COVID-19 stopped our in-person meetings. But we didn't stop interacting with our members. Throughout the three months we could not meet, approximately every two weeks we sent out a virtual care package to members that included music, videos, 19th Amendment history, children's content on the 19th Amendment, and more. It was important that we continue reaching out to our members even if we couldn't do so in traditional methods.

We (finally!) came back together in June at a local park...in-person. We had a great turnout of women! In June, we shared our concerns about the virus and the political landscape. We also voted to make donations to our female candidates running for Senate, State Senate, and State House. In July, we heard from all our local York County candidates running for office and learned how we can volunteer for their campaigns. In August, we assisted Sarah Hammond and Shanna Danielson by writing post cards encouraging people to vote. On Wednesday, August 26, we joined together in a cup of tea in memory of those who fought for the right to vote (essentially white women). That evening a local York County historian gave a presentation via Zoom to our members and those who donated to the fundraiser, speaking about York County women who helped women obtain the right to vote, as well as influential political women in York County.

The year may not be what we anticipated, but York County didn't let that stop us from helping keep democracy alive!

They use Zoom meetings to open the homes of even more voters to candidates, and they have devised new ways to actively engage attendees. A team of three Tri-County Jeopardy-themed candidates hosted a fundraiser on Zoom which was a hit and really fun. Another candidate has an upcoming "Hamilton" themed Zoom gathering planned. We are also looking forward to the release of an instructional video on the correct way to submit a mail in ballot. The candidate producing that has plans to possibly offer it in Spanish and American Sign Language, too.

Tri-County has also implemented technological advances to more effectively communicate with our members and conduct organizational business. We stay in touch through email and Facebook, sending out surveys and birthday greetings and allowing our members and member candidates to post announcements. We have established a Zoom account in order to hold virtual meetings, and our PAC has established an ActBlue account to more effectively fundraise during the pandemic and going forward. Of course, we continue to rely on more traditional forms for contactless campaigning, such as phone banking, postcard writing, and contactless lit drops to support our candidates.

If this pandemic has highlighted anything in our organization, it is the strength, resilience, creativity, and cooperation exhibited by our candidates that chose to work harder and work together when confronted by the challenges of campaigning during a global crisis. We are proud to call these women "members" and look forward to calling them "State Representatives" and "State Senator."

Region 9 – Women's Democratic Club of Franklin County Regional Director: Susan Spicka

Earlier this year when Gov. Wolf signed into law legislation providing Pennsylvania voters with the option of voting by mail, FCWomenDems decided to make registering voters our highest priority. In May, we worked with the Franklin County Democratic Committee to prepare 3,800 household letters that included vote by mail information, applications and return envelopes which reached 4.400 Democrats. Our efforts made a difference. In mid-April, just 1,061 Franklin County Dems had registered to vote by mail. By Election Day in June, that number was more than 7,000. Amazingly 71% of the ballots cast by Franklin County Democrats in the Spring Primary were mail-in ballots! During the month of August, we continued to reach additional voters through an "Adopt A Neighborhood" contactless door hanger project. Volunteers helped deliver an additional 4,200 applications to Democrats throughout the county. With Covid-19 making voting in-person more challenging and an assortment of new legislation and local procedures surrounding ballots, the club made its next goal ensuring constituents with accurate voting information. After a successful fundraising campaign, over 19,000 GOTV postcards were mailed to Democrats with resources surrounding voting by mail and in-person. In addition, due to social distancing curbing our meetings and canvassing, we have stepped up our social media communication. With efforts to undermine the Democratic process of voting, it is essential to remind voters to **VOTE BLUE FOR CHANGE!**



Region 11 – Lycoming County Democratic Women's Club President: Linda Sosniak

As a tribute to Pennsylvania's suffragists and their successful fight for the right to vote, the Lycoming County Democratic Women's Club launched a massive postcard writing campaign. Eighty-six volunteers addressed 5230 postcards urging local citizens to use their right to vote in the November election to elect Democratic candidates. The postcards featured three local female candidates running for Pennsylvania State Representative positions, Airneezer Page for the 83rd district and Amanda Waldron for the 84th district and Jackie Baker, running for the PA Senate 23rd district.

The postcards with handwritten scripts were sent to Democrats and Independents who

voted in the last two general elections. Fiftyfive of the volunteers placed stamps on the cards and mailed them. Others made donations to pay for the bulk mailing of the remainder.

The club is also selling face masks featuring four different Democratic-themed fabrics. Linda Sosniak, club president, is also the seamstress. Sale of the masks not only adds to our treasury but keeps members safe while promoting our political values.

Region 11 – Federation of Democratic Women of Indiana County President: Nancy Westburg

After a century of sacrifice, protests and hard work, women won the right to vote in 1920 with the passing of the 19th Amendment. The upcoming Presidential Election on November 3 will mark the 100-year anniversary of the first major election when women had equal voting rights. Most of the polling places back then were the local Post Offices, where women were given separate ballots, many of which were pink. Only 36% of eligible women voted in 1920, but in 2016, 63%% of eligible women voted. Since 1964, women voted at higher rates than men in Presidential Elections. On the steps of the Indiana County Post Office, the leaders of the Federation of Democratic Women of Indiana County are holding pink "ballots" commemorating Suffragists achieving the right to vote and signifying the importance of women's votes in past and future elections.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the following are the projects Federation of Democratic Women of Indiana County:

- Made a \$200 contribution to support the children's free lunch program sponsored by Spaghetti Benders after the schools were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The donation was shared with Chevy Chase's free lunch program.
- Donated 22 pizzas to the nurses and healthcare workers at Indiana Regional Medical Center to thank them for their devoted service. The pizzas were delivered to three departments during two shifts. Our organization wanted to show our appreciation to those nurses and healthcare workers who are working tirelessly on the frontline during the COVID-19 pandemic. We are grateful for their dedication now and throughout the year.
- Sent a \$300 donation to the Community Environmental Defense League Fund in honor of the East Run Hellbenders Society for their recent court win after years of fighting to protect the environment and health of the residents of Grant Township. The ongoing battle is to stop fracking companies from using Grant Township as a dumping ground for poisonous fracking waste.

- Contributed \$500 to support Tony DeLoreto's campaign for Pennsylvania State Senate in the 41st District and \$300 to support Denny Semsick's campaign for Pennsylvania House of Representatives in the 62nd District.
- Sent a Resolution to Community Rights Network that supports HB 1813 which calls for an amendment to the Pennsylvania Constitution that recognizes the right of local communities to self-govern. For years, the current system of law has favored the rights of a corporate minority above community health and safetyThis has been apparent in Grant Township where the law is not protecting their township from being a dump for toxic and radioactive waste that would destroy citizens' private wells and springs. To secure this right, the amendment includes provisions that empower communities to legally stop unwanted and harmful activities that would damage their neighborhoods. It also empowers communities to make decisions free from illegitimate preemptive laws and corporate interference.
- Entered an agreement with PennDOT to participate in the Adopt and Beautify program. Two signs will be erected at the adopted sites to acknowledge our beautification efforts and contributions.
- Held two General Membership Zoom Meetings with Democratic County Commissioner Sherene Hess as guest speaker. The first meeting topic was the impact of COVID-19 on our community and the second meeting topic was the issues that were important to our members in upcoming meetings.

WE'VE BEEN BUSY

Clinton County Democratic Women contacted 10,600 households, either by mail or literature dropped at their door during this general election cycle.

We have a wonderful, local candidate for the Pennsylvania 76th District: Joe Waltz, the former chair of the Clinton County Democratic Committee (CCDC). This was a seat held by a Democrat for the 1ast 22 years and was lost in 2018. We proposed a postcard campaign to support Joe Waltz and win back the House seat.

Joan Heller, club vice president, originally presented idea. the Roxanne Embick, club treasurer, determined that would we need approximately 10,000 postcards in order to deliver postcard at every a

registered Democrat and Independent's door either by mail or lit drop. The members voted funds to print the cards. Joe Waltz's campaign designed the postcard. Roxanne created address labels and Shanan Miller. club secretary, printed them. Roxanne and Joan created a list of suggested messages for the cards. 47 CCDW and CCDC members wrote and provided stamps for 6600 cards. A group of Centre County women coordinated Margie by Swoboda

stepped up to organize volunteers to help with the Centre County portion of the 76th District. She and a group of 50 women wrote and provided stamps for 3000 cards. In the end, many members stepped up with major donations of funding and their own time to complete this project. A total of 9,600 handwritten messages for Joe Waltz were mailed September 1st.

CCDW then organized a lit-drop of 1000 doors in Clinton County for the

Democratic Coordinated Campaign. Patricia Hancock, club president, purchased the plastic sleeves. The lit-drop bags include a Biden/Harris palm card, a Waltz flyer and postcard, a Margie Brown for PA Senate card. a Lee Griffin for Congress card, a Voter Registration information card, and a note from CCDW. We expect to complete the lit drop by Oct 2nd.

Region 13 – Blair County Federation of Women President: Donna Cohen

Because of the Coronavirus, the last meeting of our club was in February; however, that does not mean that we have not done anything to help with the election. For example, we have been phone banking for Vice-President Biden, working individually from our homes rather than coming together as a group. We help provide yard signs and information by manning the Democratic Committee office and answering people's questions about the logistics of voting. Some members have been writing post cards to get out the vote. This has been a hard year for all of us, but we are trying our best to elect President Biden and our Democratic Congressional candidate Todd Rowley and to turn Blair County Blue.

Region 13 – Democratic Women of Westmoreland (WOW) Phyllis Friend, President

The Democratic Women of Westmoreland have been busy, despite not being able to meet in person since Spring, meeting virtually since the beginning of the pandemic. A regular feature at our zoom meetings are updates from a representative from the Women for Biden group and the local Back to Blue organizer to help us learn various ways to help.

Members are informed on a weekly basis through an email from President Phyllis Friend. Dedicated member, Joanne Garing, writes a weekly script of "action items" which is included in the weekly email. WOW officers are working hard to keep the group intact; even gaining a few new members during this unusual time.

WOW members have written and called their representatives about the HEROES ACT, the USPS situation, Hatch Act, as well as Vote by Mail issues. Vice President Carol Mintus has travelled to Altoona to attend a protest lobbying for the passing of the HEROES Act. She also attended a rally in Philadelphia to help organize a new faculty union at a college there.

WOW also has a new Facebook group to share local campaign events, upcoming Biden campaign events, and educational articles relating to women's successes in politics and in general. Our Communications Director, Sandy Kremer does a wonderful job keeping our Democratic women informed. WOW has donated to local campaigns and many members are actively working to elect local candidates, as well as the Biden-Harris ticket, taking advantage of the campaign's zoom meetings to learn more about how to be more effective. Several of our members have been instrumental in organizing fundraising events as well as community events for local candidates.

Because of the huge demand in our county for Biden-Harris signs, WOW purchased 100 signs for our members. We believe, more than ever, that this is the most important election of our lifetime. Members are participating in phone banking, text banking, lit dropping, and postcard writing to get out the vote for the Biden-Harris and other Democrats in the November election.


