A Word from the New President

First, I want to thank the immediate Past President, *Ruth Raglin*, for returning the Federation to a firm financial footing. She has a gift for raising money in auctions and events.

When I ran for President of the Pennsylvania Federation of Democratic Women, I pledged to improve our relationships with elected officials. Almost all our statewide officials are male. When they explore whether to run, they tend to consult Trial Lawyers and Executives in major cities, and the leaders of the most powerful unions.

Who are the women they talk to? Why shouldn't we be those women?

Part of becoming those women is educating officials and candidates about how useful we already are to them. For instance, many of our clubs excel at circulating nominating petitions. Some clubs have impressive *Get Out Our Vote* skills. In fact, some clubs are a "ready to go" campaign committee for candidates they support.

One step in making more connections is inviting Democratic PA House Leader Joanna McClinton to keynote our Outstanding Elected Democratic Women Brunch in November. She is the first woman ever to hold this position. You'll find more details about the event elsewhere in this Survey. Another step is the *Get Out the Vote* postcard drive, also described elsewhere in this Survey.

My own background is working on campaigns at all levels. As a young person I worked in politics in Washington, D.C., and in the U.S. Senate. My late husband talked me into coming back to Pennsylvania to marry him, and we both taught communication for Penn State until he died. Those two horrible years in medical hell with him sent me back into politics, to work for people who would give us health care reform. Now, seeing the damage the Trump years have done to the status of women, I want to work with you to put us in a better position in Pennsylvania.

Our new Vice Presidents will tell you about their plans in the next issue. They are: Lori Heffner, First Vice President, Helen Cook, Second Vice President, Sharon Newmane, Third Vice President, Shelley Glessner, Fourth Vice President, Colleen Gerrity, Fifth Vice President, and Shantale Galloway, Sixth Vice President.

The other members of the Executive Board are Joanne McGahagan, Corresponding Secretary, Melinda Thomas, Recording Secretary, and Roxanne Embick, Treasurer.

The Judicial Elections: What's in it for You?

If you've met them, you know our candidates are people who have done constructive things and are fun to be around. They all are judges now and don't need on the job training, and all are recommended or highly recommended by the PA Bar Association. Neither of those things are true of the Republican candidates.

I know some of you wonder, what's that got to do with you? Donald Trump, that's what.

Remember those 60+ lawsuits he filed to try to steal the presidential election? He only won two of them in the entire country—here in Pennsylvania, from our Commonwealth Court.

So who are the Republicans running for PA Supreme Court? Yes, Trump's guy, the President Judge of the Commonwealth Court. Our Supreme Court reversed those two Commonwealth Court decisions of his last year, so now he wants to go up to the Supreme Court. That can't be good for us.

What's Commonwealth Court? It's the one that handles cases involving government, and cases involving workers' rights.

Right now, the Republicans control it, 7-2. And it's the court of original jurisdiction about election law. Have you heard about all the personal data the Republicans in the Legislature want to collect for their investigation into Trump's claims of voter fraud? Why do they need your Social Security number, your driver's license number, and your email address on top of your birthday, home address, and party of registration?

Not to examine the last election—they know that was clean. They want you to run the risk of identity theft so they can poke around for some flimsy excuse to tighten voting regulations; to make it harder to vote if you are young, old, a person of color, a person struggling with physical challenges, or in any other grouping that makes you more likely to vote democratic.

What to do to stop them?

First, make sure you tell everybody you know to vote for our **Judge Maria McLaughlin** for Supreme Court. Not voting this year is the same as voting for Trump. The Republicans have \$12 million in a dark money campaign account—that we know of. The \$3 million in ads they are running now are nothing to what will come. Will there be any truth in their ads? What do you think?

Second, help clean up Commonwealth court so we can get a fair shake there. If we elect our candidates **Judge Lori Dumas** and **Judge David Spurgeon**, we can change that court from 7-2 Republican to 5-4. The result would be a much better chance of a fair decision on all aspects of workers' rights, environmental policy, and redistricting—just for starters.

Third, the other court, Superior Court, handles family law and other disputes among individuals. Right now, that Court is 8-7



Republican. If we elect our **Judge Timika** Lane, Democrats will take control.

Who gets to be a judge impacts your life in ways far beyond what seems obvious at first glance. If you doubt it, look at the mess the U.S. Supreme Court is creating. All that's saving us in Pennsylvania is our own Supreme Court—where Democrats are in the majority.

For now...If you help us keep it that way.

This isn't an off year election. The winners this year will protect your rights, or erode them. Please don't let the Republicans turn Pennsylvania into Texas. Please do everything you can to help elect our four judges. You'll never be sorry you stood up for democracy.

Judge Maria McLaughlin

Judge Maria McLaughlin's unmatched work ethic shows in her flawless record; in ten years as a judge, none following a divorce. She passes along that none of her decisions ever have been reversed on appeal. The first in her family to go to college, she worked her way through school, then rose in the Philadelphia D.A.'s office to become section chief protecting children while raising her two boys as a single mother; the example set by her parents of helping those in need to build constructive lives in her service on and off the bench.

Judge Timika Lane

For seven years, Judge Timika Lane has served as a Judge on the Court of Common Pleas. As the only Judge in the race for PA Superior Court, Judge Lane is the experienced judge we need on this important statewide court. Beyond the bench, Judge Lane's working class roots, and her record of service as a teacher, child advocate, public defender, and Executive Director of the PA Senate State Government Committee give her the perspective to understand the impact her decisions will have on Pennsylvanians every day. Judge Lane needs your help to flip the Superior Court from Red to Blue.

Judge David Spurgeon

Since 2016, Judge David Spurgeon has been a trial judge in Allegheny County hearing cases involving families and children. Named a National Judicial Fellow for his judicial leadership, Spurgeon is a nationally recognized expert in domestic violence. He previously spent 19 years as a trial lawyer and lead prosecutor for cases involving family violence. Spurgeon was integral in the creation and supervision of treatment courts in Allegheny County. The first in his family to attend college/law school, he is the only candidate rated "Highly Recommended" by the PBA. Spurgeon also teaches as an adjunct law professor at Duquesne Law School.

Judge Lori Dumas

The Court can't earn public trust if it is viewed as a citadel of privilege. How can there be trust if there is no equity at all levels of the court? Women judges offer a lived experience, a more comprehensive and empathetic perspective, their rulings take into account the consequences to real people, not just the judicial action. Judge Dumas has 19 years of this lived experience in Civil, Criminal, and Family Court. She brings judicial mastery and diverse perspectives to the court and that's not just good for women, but for all people. And it is what is absolutely necessary to restore trust and balance to the application of the rule of law in this very important Court.

National Federation of Democratic Women First Vice President: Susan Rutt

It was an honor to be elected First Vice President of the National Federation of Democratic Women's Convention in June.

Other officers elected were: President Gail Buckner of Georgia; Second Vice President Barbara Faison of North Carolina; Third Vice President Gini Ballou of Idaho; Fourth Vice President Debi Thompson of Oklahoma; Fifth Vice President Christine Pelosi of California; Recording Secretary Peggy Stepp of Missouri; Treasurer Dorinda White of Washington, D.C.; Eastern Regional Director Irmgard Pagan of Puerto Rico.

Appointed positions include Corresponding Secretary Dorothy Adams of Missouri and Parliamentarian Wanda Ashley of Arkansas. Now in my ninth year on the NFDW Board as Regional Director, Treasurer, Second Vice President and currently as First Vice President, it is a privilege to continue serving with outstanding leaders from all across the country.

Due to COVID, the NFDW was unable to hold in-person in 2020 and 2021 such as: Women in Blue, National Conventions fall board meetings. With the exception of Women in Blue 2020, all events were offered electronically. We are hoping to hold Women in Blue in Washington, and our 2022 convention in New Orleans in June.

On August 31, the NFDW PAC held a virtual event. Participants included Senator Elizabeth Warren, Senator Hillary Clinton, Senator Amy Klobachar, and Representative Jahanna Hayes. I had the pleasure of introducing a presentation by Luci Baines Johnson, daughter of the late President Lyndon Johnson.

Region 1 – Black Democratic Women of Montgomery County President: Adrian Crowder and Gwen Boykin



As 2021 draws to a close, the Black Democratic Women of Montgomery County is adjusting to the post pandemic new normal. We continue to meet virtually, and unfortunately, our fundraising events have been limited due to social distancing. For the November Election, we are supporting our club member A. Nicole Phillips as she runs for Judge in the Court of Common Pleas and others running for local and statewide offices.

We are canvassing neighborhoods, sending postcards and making phone calls.



Our club member and Ambler Borough Councilwoman, Jennifer Henderson, is leading the efforts to build the Ambler Community Garden. This project was awarded \$45K and was amongst 23 initiatives in Montgomery County to improve infrastructure and sustainability.



In September, we had an information exchange session with Professor Wendy Greene, a Drexel University Law Professor, trailblazing U.S. Anti-Discrimination Law Scholar, Teacher and advocate, who explained the C.R.O.W.N. Act and the reasons behind the need for a law that prohibits racebased hair discrimination due to the texture of hair or protective hair styles. We will be aligning with State Representative Joanna McClinton to propel passage of this law in Pennsylvania.



Lastly, as we approach 2022, another focus of our Club will be flipping an open U.S. Senate seat, and getting our club member Dr. Val Arkoosh elected as the first woman in Pennsylvania to the Senate.
